87-2024 A Resolution to Adopt a Negative Declaration Under SEQRA for the 465 Miller Road Solar, LLC and 465 Miller Road Solar West, LLC Large Scale Solar Project

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of East Greenbush (the "Town Board") is in receipt of an application by 465 Miller Road Solar, LLC & 465 Miller Road Solar West, LLC (the "Applicant"), known collectively as the Seaboard Solar Project (the "Project"), which involves the construction and operation of a solar energy generation facility with a total capacity of 10 MWac on approximately 80 acres of land encompassing 465 Miller Rd and 465 Miller Rd South, East Greenbush, NY 12061; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board, acting as Lead Agency in a Coordinated Review, undertook an environmental review of the proposed Type 1 action, the Seaboard Solar Project, commencing after the submission of the application by the Applicant; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has carefully reviewed the development proposal, plans, a Long Environmental Assessment Form Part 1, and related reports and studies for this project in accordance with Title 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law and 6NYCRR Part 617 and the New York Solar Guidebook For Local Governments: State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) for Solar, for potential significant adverse environmental impacts as a result of the action, with the attachments of said Long Environmental Assessment Form Part 1, Part 2, and Part 3 marked as Exhibit A, Exhibit B, and Exhibit C, respectively; and

WHEREAS, mitigation measures, as appropriate to this solar project proposal, have been incorporated into the design of this project; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has compared the proposed action against the criteria listed in the New York Solar Guidebook for Local Governments: State Environmental Quality Review (SEQR) for Solar and has considered the potential long-term, short-term, direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts as per section 3.4 Determine Significance and has also assessed the likely consequence of the action; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board has compared the proposed action against the criteria listed in 6NYCRR Part 617.7(c) (i – xii) and has considered the potential long-term, short-term, direct, indirect, and cumulative impacts as per 617.7 (2) and has also assessed the likely consequence of the action in connection with the criteria of 617.7 (3) (i-vii); and
now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board , upon completion of the coordinated review as required by 6 NYCRR Part 617, hereby declares itself lead agency and re-affirms the classification of the action as a Type 1 Action and based on the environmental assessment and review, the Town Board has determined that the project will not have any significant adverse effects on the environmental and that a negative declaration, pursuant to Part 3 of the Long Environmental Assessment Form attached hereto, is hereby adopted;

WHEREAS, Terry Sharp is the Town’s Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) Assistant Operator who possesses a Grade 4A Operators License and who assists with process control and operations on a part-time basis; and

WHEREAS, Terry Sharp was the previous Chief Sewage Treatment Plant Operator until his retirement from the Town and was appointed as a Part-Time Operators Consultant in 2016 via resolution 227-2016 at a rate of \$40.00 per hour; and

WHEREAS, Terry Sharp currently operates as the Assistant Operator on a part-time basis alongside Steve Skowron while the Town continues to seek applications for full time operators of the Treatment Plant; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Public Works recommends that due to the increase in responsibilities and time being spent at the WWTP that Terry Sharp’s hourly rate be increased to \$50.00 per hour; and

WHEREAS, to be in compliance with the Town’s SPDES permit, it is critical to maintain Terry Sharp as a licensed operator at the WWTP; and

92-2024 A Resolution Updating the Transfer Station Information Sheet and Rates for 2024

WHEREAS, Commissioner of Public Works has recommended changes be made to the Transfer Station Information Sheet and Rates for 2024 to better reflect the agreement the Town has with the Capital Region Solid Waste Management Partnership that we are a part of; and

WHEREAS, the Town currently charges permit holders for the recycling of televisions and monitors and in return is charged by E-Lots Recycling; and

WHEREAS, the update in rates would remove the fee for the permit holders by becoming a program partner, a status introduced in the new NYS regulations. A program partner is a collection site, consolidation facility, or recycler working with others to meet the acceptance standard of a manufacturer’s program while providing free recycling of covered electronic equipment (CEE). Program partners cannot charge consumers or each other for the acceptance of CEE, and

WHEREAS, as part of the recycling program, the Town shouldn’t be charged for electronic recycling, but because we have charged for the recycling of monitors and screens, E-Lots had to charge us. This update will correct this process; and

WHEREAS, the Transfer Station Operators recommended to the Commissioner of Public Works that we create a set fee for a One-Time Use Fee for non-permit holders that would like to utilize the Transfer Station for disposal household items, such as a mattress, spring clean out, family members house clean out, etc, plus a charge for items per the fee schedule; and

WHEREAS, creating this One-Time Use Fee will create a set price for this process and document it so it will be universally charged to those that want to take advantage of the Transfer Station; and

WHEREAS, the Director of Finance confirms that this resolution will not have a material impact on the Town’s finances:

94-2024 A Resolution Approving Gimondo Epoxy and Concrete, Inc. to Complete the Department of Public Works Garage Breakroom and Locker Room Floor

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Public Works has identified a number of projects to update the Department of Public Works Garage, one being the removal of VCT Tile and application of Epoxy on the floors; and

WHEREAS, the Deputy Commissioner did a Request for Quotes for the project, calling a number of local companies that are qualified to complete this project and set up appointments for each contractor to conduct a site visit; and

WHEREAS, upon the suggestion from each company that visited the garage, the tiles and floor glue was tested for asbestos by Alpine Environmental and results showed that there was no concern for asbestos when removing the tiles; and

WHEREAS, three quotes were received from contractors as follows:
