Communications/Announcements/Reports

Councilor Tierney – Said she did not have any comments and that she was excited for the K-9 presentation.

Councilor Kennedy – Congratulated our stellar Community Services Department, Mike Martin and Taylor Tibbetts for completing a successful 6 weeks of summer youth activities. With protocols in place, it resulted in no COVID cases. Extended thanks to activity counselors, Emily Dick, Mike Iula, Caitlin Lallier, Kelsey Hall and Kara Blakeman – all returning from last year.

Councilor Matters – Welcomed Supervisor Conway back, and mentioned stellar job by Deputy Supervisor Tierney. Speaking of challenges, brought to attention the school district and their plan to reopen. Derives comfort from our Superintendent and his ability to meet those challenges.

Councilor Fritz – Pointed out the progress on the rail trail. Reminded everyone to do their part to help keep our community clean.

Supervisor Conway – Stated that as a society we need to recognize that our teachers are facing a problematic school year. Said they have to worry about their students' health as well as their own while finding a way to teach kids what they need to learn. Mentioned teachers are essential beyond any doubt and we need to support them as well as the kids. Indicated we have a lot of great teachers and know they'll do great. As a community we need to acknowledge them as they face a tough road and we need to support them in any way we can.

Open Public Privilege: NOTE – Each speaker may choose to state name and address prior to addressing the Board and shall be granted the floor for up to five minutes. The Board thanks everyone in attendance for their understanding and also for their desire to actively participate in the decision making process. All speakers must conduct themselves in a civil manner. Personal attacks will not be tolerated.

Presentation: K-9 Unit for the Police Department – Officer Josh Witko

Officer Witko, for over 5 years now, has been with the East Greenbush Police Department, thanked the Town Board for giving him the opportunity to present. Also thanked Troy Police Department and their two K-9 handlers and their new K-9 who attended. Officer Witko did a fine presentation discussing the K-9 Unit and reestablishing a program in East Greenbush.

Comments:

Supervisor Conway – Asked if we got a dog, if it would be a drug or bomb dog. Officer Witko mentioned it would be something that would have to be agreed upon. He thinks for what our town needs and our Police Department deals with, a drug dog would be more beneficial. Supervisor didn't like to hear the cost involved, however, Officer Witko explained how to pay for it, including a substantial donation from Regeneron – they said they would love to donate. Supervisor asked about a dog and a certain age when they retire. Officer Witko and Troy Police Officer mentioned typically the dog serves 6-8 years, however, its dog dependent.

Councilor Tierney – thanked Officer Witko very much for doing this and for Troy Police coming as well. Stated this was excellent. Particularly glad the school district functions was one of the events on the list, and also glad to see Wal-Mart on the list for grants as they are clearly generous when asked. Officer Witko was asked what interests him in particular to this. He mentioned this has always been a dream to him. He'd love to see a K-9 Unit reestablished in East Greenbush. Even if a dog didn't go to him, it would still benefit him and our Police Department in their work. Troy has been called numerous times. Councilor Tierney commended his talent for presentations.

Councilor Matters – Indicated he was here when Rick Kemner ran the program and did hear of the benefits. Would like to look at what metric we would want to observe in terms of the relevant benefits in our suburban class town. Community policing is appealing. Expressed concerns of recurring costs and that the rest of the Town Board is sensitive to that as well. Officer Witko mentioned the initial startup of the program is the hump to get over, then the costs are minimal.

Troy Police Officer – Added the initial startup is the significant cost, after that is what the agreement is between the municipality and the handler. Ongoing recurring costs are minimal and most vets will donate their services. Most places will donate food.

Councilor Fritz – Mentioned she would like to see some numbers on how many traffic stops this could be a potential for. Officer Witko mentioned essentially any traffic stop. If an officer can articulate why he would need a dog, we would have one ready and on the street. He thinks we would see a vast increase in drug seizures, which accumulates to money made for the town. Supervisor Conway mentioned asset forfeiture. Other options as well going into schools,

Post Office, train station – not just traffic stops. Troy Police Officer stated they are constantly being called outside of their jurisdiction to assist other federal agencies.

Chief Rudzinski – In discussing missing residents, she said we've been fortunate that Troy and Chief Owens have come on numerous occasions to assist in searches.

Resident, Oji Reed – In support of this and stated it was an asset when the sergeant was here. Talked about opioid problem in area schools and also 9J and 9&20.

Supervisor Conway – Mentioned we will proceed with next step with meeting with Meaghan Hart, Director of Finance, Chief Rudzinski and Officer Witko. Costs should be itemized, look at grant programs, and need statistics. Taking next step, however, making no commitment as it is expensive.

Open Public Comments:

Oji Reed – Complaint about Oriel Lane and new house built behind him. Thinks limitation is 35 feet for height and its 46 feet. He was told they were supposed to get a variance and that never occurred. He or other neighbors were not notified. Supervisor Conway mentioned we should look into the issue of the variance and see if one was needed.

A Resolution Authorizing the Execution of a Settlement Agreement in the Matter of Rudolf P. Schlegel, Inc. V. the Zoning Board of Appeals of the Town of East Greenbush and Adam Yagelski, Director of Planning and Zoning

WHEREAS, by petition and notice of petition dated January 8, 2020, a proceeding pursuant to Article 78 of the Civil Practice Law and Rules was brought by Rudolph P. Schlegel, Inc., against the Zoning Board of Appeals of the Town of East Greenbush and Adam Yagelski, as Director of Planning and Zoning; and

WHEREAS, Rudolf P. Schlegel, Inc. is the owner of certain property located at 103 Columbia Turnpike, and a separate parcel directly behind 103 Columbia Turnpike; and

WHEREAS, said Article 78 proceeding challenged a certain determination by the East Greenbush Zoning Board of Appeals, dated December 13, 2019, denying Schlegel's application for a use variance to allow the rear vacant lot to be used as accessory parking to the automotive and repair business at 103 Columbia Turnpike; and

WHEREAS, upon service of such petition and notice of petition, the Town respondents and the attorney for the petitioner entered into discussions about possible resolutions of the matter, thereby avoiding the need for the Town to expend funds for legal representation; and

WHEREAS, the Town representatives and the petitioner have reached a proposed Settlement Agreement, providing that the premises at 103 Columbia Turnpike can continue to be used for automotive service and repair operations, and that the petitioner and/or a new tenant of the property may use the property for such purposes; that such use shall not be considered discontinued pursuant to the Comprehensive Zoning Law of the Town of East Greenbush (provided such use is commenced within one year from the date the agreement is executed by all parties); and

WHEREAS, said agreement also provides that the Town never abandoned the original Catskill Avenue right-of-way in the Town of East Greenbush, so that the rear parcel located behind 103 Columbia Turnpike continues to have uninterrupted direct access to Catskill Avenue; and

WHEREAS, the Commissioner of Public Works has determined that the most cost effective solution to rebuilding the sewer main at that location is to install cured-in-place pipe lining; and

"The Town of East Greenbush is responsible for assuring the health and safety of all employees. In keeping with this objective, the Town of East Greenbush does not permit employees to bring their household pets to work. Animals may pose a threat of infection and may cause allergic reactions in other employees. Some employees may feel threatened or be distracted by the presence of animals, particularly dogs. In addition, the Town of East Greenbush wishes to prevent pets from fouling the office space or damaging company property.

An employee who requires the assistance of a service animal (defined by 28 CFR 36.104 as "any dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability") will be permitted to bring a service animal to the office, provided that the animal's presence does not create a danger to others and does not impose an undue hardship upon the organization."

WHEREAS, the Town Comptroller confirms that this resolution will not have a material impact on the Town's finances:

RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of East Greenbush approves the addition of the Office Pet Policy, in the form of the text cited above, to the Employee Handbook and directs the Human Resources Manager to oversee its inclusion.



K-9 Program Proposal



Purpose of a K-9 Program

- A K-9 program will provide the Patrol Division and the Detective Division with additional tools and resources to efficiently and effectively complete:
 - Criminal investigations;
 - Drug and crime interdictions;
 - Provide officer safety; and
 - Increase community interaction and outreach.

Benefits of a K-9 Program

The Police K-9's extraordinary ability to smell, and determination are recognized both nationally and internationally. The Police dog would be cross-trained to:

- Locate illegal drugs;
- Track lost and/or endangered children and adults;
- Reduce time and provide for a safer means to complete building searches;
- Assist officers during arrests, search warrants and apprehensions;
- Be a highly visible deterrent to criminal activity;
- Perform public relations between the Police and community; and
- Provide appearance and demonstrations at various community functions.

History of the East Greenbush Police K-9 Program

- Established in 1985 with unanimous support and approval by Chief John Burns and the Town Board.
- Following a one-year trial, the K-9 program was authorized to continue as part of the Patrol Division.
- There were five German Shepard K-9s all trained and handled by Sgt. Rick Kemner. The five K9s were:
 - K9-1 Askar (male)
 - K9-2 Belinda (female)
 - K9-3 Rio (male)
 - K9-4 Hilde (female)
 - K9-5 Artus (male)





K-9 History (Cont.)

- All of the East Greenbush Police K9s were trained and certified in:
 - Tracking
 - General multi-purpose patrol functions
 - Narcotic detection
- The K-9 regularly assisted police agencies throughout the region. In addition to East Greenbush, Rensselaer Police and Schodack Police also had K-9s (which no longer exist today).
- The K-9 program was disbanded in 2007 with the retirement of Sgt. Kemner.

How will a K-9 Benefit East Greenbush?

- Assist officers conduct vehicle searches during traffic stops to locate drugs and contraband.
- Assist officers search for missing, endangered and wanted persons, without the delay or availability from a mutual aide agency.
- Deter drug and criminal activities in neighborhoods and high risk locations (e.g. WalMart, FedEx, East Greenbush Technology Park, the Port District, Regeneron, hotels and schools).
- Provide assistance and another level of Office safety on high risk calls. Provides a less lethal tool for use-of-force to combat resistance.

Benefits to East Greenbush (Cont.)

- Greater community interaction and public relations to support community policing activities:
 - "PWTs" Park, walk and talk.
 - Property and location checks.
 - Support patrol on the Albany-Hudson Electric Trail.
 - Crime prevention and education events.
 - Town activities and functions (i.e. movies in the park, Saturday in the Park, day camp, activities sponsored at the Town Park, senior activities etc.).
 - School District functions and sporting events.

How to maintain a successful Program?

SUPPORT!! In order for the program to be successful, there needs to be unanimous commitment from the Department and the Town Board to support the program financially and adjustments to day-to-day operations.

Operational Impacts:

- Initial program costs;
- On-going financial support;
- Day-to-Day operations; and
- New and/or revised policies and procedures.

Program Costs

- Purchase of a K-9: \$6,500-\$8,500
- Initial Recommended Equipment: \$25,000
- Dedicated K-9 patrol vehicle: \$45,000-\$50,000
- Annual costs (food, vet, care, miscellaneous): \$3,000
- In-Service Training (8 hours per month/certification)
- Handler Certification: TBD
- Handler Compensation (FLSA)- agreed upon amount per day for dog maintenance (bathing, grooming, exercising, feeding etc.)- Taken as pay or comp. time

Annual Training

- United States Police Canine Association membership costs (\$100 per year).
- Troy PD's K-9 program is growing fast and they will soon have a master instructor and be able to host their own training.
- Combined in-service training with Troy PD, Colonie PD, Saratoga CSO, Rensselaer CSO and Albany CSO.

Funding/Grant Opportunities

- There are numerous organizations who offer grant and funding opportunities to establish and support a K9 program such as:
 - Stanton Foundation Grant \$25,000 for startup
 - National Association of Chief of Police K-9 Program for training, equipment and supplies – matching grant raised dollar for dollar up to \$5,000
 - National Police Dog Foundation Grant for K-9 Heat Alarm, initial purchasing and training
 - Regeneron has offered \$30,000 (15k for startup and then 15k after program is up and running)
 - Brady's K9 Fund K9 vest Committed Donation
 - Project Paws Alive K9 vest and trauma kits
 - Spirit of Blue Foundation K9 equipment needs
 - K-9's for law.org Training and initial purchase

Funding/Grant Opportunities (Cont.)

- Business donations (e.g Regeneron, WalMart, Target, FedEx, Pet Smart, East Greenbush Vet, Fuccillo Ford).
- Fundraisers (pancake breakfast, softball tournament, golf tournament, Chinese raffles, car washes, national night out, coffee with a cop, cookies with a cop, park walk talks, etc.)

Summary

- We would like to reestablish a K-9 program in the East Greenbush Police Department.
- A K9 will benefit our community, officers, and keep our schools, businesses and community members <u>safer</u>.
- Although the initial cost is large, there will be a greater return on investment to the community as the deterrent of a K-9 is unmatched!
